Phonics

What is phonics? This is learning the sounds that children need to read and write words. As children learn their letter sounds (phonemes) they are able to blend them to read

unknown words. In writing, the sounds are called graphemes and they help children to be able to spell words.

Little Wandle



This is a new reading scheme we have established at Portsdown that uses a systematic synthetic phonics (SSP) program.

Reading in school

All children read phonics books to apply their in class phonics learning.

- In Year R children read one to one at least once a week with a book at their reading level.
- In Year 1 children read in small groups every day with an adult with a book at their reading level.
- In Year 2 children read every day in small groups with a focus and are monitored by the class teacher.

What books will my child bring home from school?

Reading practice book—this book is at the correct phonics stage for your child. It is marked with a sticker to show that this book is a book they need to read with you.

<u>Reading challenges</u>—please make sure you hear your child read this phonics/reading practice book at least 4 times a week. Each year group has their own reading challenge where children can earn prizes and rewards for reading to you at home!

Why is reading at home so important?

'Reading for pleasure is the single most important indicator of a child's success'. (OCED 2002)

<u>A sharing book</u> Every week, your child will come home with a new Library book. This is a book for you to read **together** at home. See your class newsletter for which day your child will change their book.
